A Modern Industry Requires a Modern Lien Framework

The way industry builds is changing. Our legislation needs to keep pace. Modern construction increasingly involves fabrication and assembly taking place away from the traditional jobsite. Modular and prefabricated construction can improve efficiency, quality, safety, scheduling, and productivity. As these practices evolve, so too must the legislative framework that supports them.

A recent bulletin from McMillan LLP, *Building Differently, Liening Differently? – Lien Rights and Modular Prefabricated Construction*, in partnership with MCA Canada, highlights an important question for contractors and the construction industry: how do existing lien rights apply when significant portions of a project are fabricated somewhere other than the construction site?

This is an issue that MCAM identified in a broader discussion around modernizing Manitoba's Builders' Liens legislation. The association is represented on the Manitoba Builders' Liens Modernization Review Committee, working alongside government and industry partners to examine how the legislation can better reflect the realities of today's construction industry. The legislative framework needs to recognize how work is actually being performed today and provide clarity around the rights and responsibilities that follow.

There is an opportunity for Manitoba to take a thoughtful approach to this emerging issue. Changes that recognize modern fabrication and prefabrication practices could provide greater clarity for industry while supporting innovation and productivity. They could also help position Manitoba as a leader on an issue that other jurisdictions may increasingly need to address as these construction methods continue to grow.

For MCAM, this is an important part of effective industry advocacy: ensuring the realities facing mechanical contractors are understood and considered where decisions are being made. As construction continues to evolve, the frameworks that govern our industry need to evolve with it.
